

Dear Friends

How quickly time passes when we are enjoying ourselves! I can't believe I have been minister here for nearly two years already!

People said if we survived the winter we would stay! Well we have more than survived two winters and never thought once about giving up! Island living seems to suit us very well and we are both loving the work God has called us to here. It is great to see Graeme more fully involved in music outside of school – playing the organ, Music Matters, the Carol concert, helping young people develop their musical skills and he is now hoping to play an ENORMOUS tuba with Arran Brass!

As the snowdrops and spring flowers make their welcome appearance in the garden, a hymn has been running through my mind for several weeks:

'In the bulb there is a flower; in the seed, an apple tree; in cocoons, a hidden promise: butterflies will soon be free! In the cold and snow of winter there's a Spring that waits to be, unrevealed until its season, Something God alone can see.'



It is God's wonderful promise of the hidden potential in each of us. The Singing Group have been practising this hymn and it will feature as 'Hymn of the Month' when we will sing it every Sunday in March. This not only helps us learn new hymns but also helps us focus on the words as we learn.

Development proposals are moving along, albeit slowly. We have had a very successful meeting with the General Trustees and CARTA (the Church of Scotland Committee on Art & Architecture) who have given us tremendous help in how we progress ideas. The Kirk Session have been updated and the next step is to have a look at how other churches have developed their sanctuary. We want to ensure the character of the building is retained while making changes that allow more flexible use throughout the week, rather than having our beautiful building used only on Sundays. The Christmas Carol Concert confirmed the absolute need for greater flexibility.

Of course, more important than anything is our commitment to serve.







Dr Robert Buchanan 7 September 1924 - 10 December 2016

Ordained in 1955, Dr Robert Buchanan set an example few could match. Dedicated to the end, he attended as many Kirk Session meetings as he could.

He was faithful in being in worship every Sunday. He was determined at every

Communion to take his place at the Communion table, and he always pulled himself up for the hymns & the Benediction. Church mattered to Dr Robert and we have been blessed in this church to have had such a caring and steadfast Elder for so many years.

All of us think of Dr Robert, with great affection and admiration. He had a lasting impact on so many people down through the years. His Grandfather was a farmer and his father, James, a doctor - it is no surprise that

Robert followed in his father's footsteps. Robert studied medicine at Glasgow University. Dr Robert was extremely proud of his heritage - his father was Chairman of the Hospital Board, and was a well-respected GP and surgeon at the Arran War Memorial Hospital on the island.

Dr Robert always strived to do his best - to live up to the high esteem he had for his Dad. In those days, GPs worked very long hours and responded immediately to anyone in need. Apart from his duties as a GP, he was Anaesthetist at the hospital as well as working in Obstetrics.

Of course, this takes its toll on family life and his young family missed out sometimes when their Dad would be caring for others - whether in the adjacent surgery which went on until everyone was attended to, or hospital duties, or callouts.

Add to this Dr Robert's commitment as a founder member of the Mountain Rescue Team and we have to marvel at his dedication and energy.

Dr Robert never lost his great sense of fun. He thoroughly enjoyed being Grandpa and Great Grandpa and could be seen having fun kicking a football about with them - but, of course, ALWAYS wearing a jacket and tie!

His wonderful sense of humour also stayed with him right to the end! When Rev Lily visited him in hospital, he took off the oxygen mask, and smiled at her saying "I don't think I'll manage church on Sunday."

(Extracts from the tribute at Dr Robert's Funeral Service by Rev Lily McKinnon - Ed)

Nearly 50 years ago, our neighbour (Hugh Lamberton) had a heart attack and Dr Robert was informed by 'phone. Robert dashed along to Hugh's home expecting him to be there, but could not find him. Fortunately I saw Robert and was able to tell him that he was visiting our neighbour (Agnes Searle) on the other side of our house. Without hesitating, he ran along our garden path, at the end of which I had a 'squelchy' compost heap piled up against the wall. At full speed he put one foot on the compost and jumped over the wall to attend Hugh. Hugh survived, but I wondered what state Robert's shoe and lower trouser leg was in.

My sister Catherine was terminally ill (Hodgkin's Disease) and when she finally had to give up work she came to live with my mother and father in Bungalow Road. Robert was her doctor, and the care and attention he gave her was excellent and very much appreciated by Catherine and the family. I think he admired her spirit - from having been given 3 years to live, she actually lived 7 years. When she died she was cremated at Ayr. Robert asked me what was going to happen with

Catherine's ashes and I said I was going to scatter them near the top of the Brodick road, overlooking Lamlash Bay and Holy Island as requested by Catherine. Robert asked if he could come with me the sort of kind gesture one never forgets.

He had celebrated his 90th birthday and I was absolutely fascinated listening to his life story, with his sense of humour coming to the fore. I recall him telling me "I'm not ready for the underground yet" which became the title of the article! Dr Robert told me his favourite tune was "Highland Cathedral", how fitting this was played at his funeral, very moving. A dear gentleman, who will be sadly missed by his family, his church and his friends.

I had the privilege of serving with Betty on the Nominating Committee and we both attend the Singing Group on Wednesday evenings.



THE FALLS OF CLYDE - A POSTCRIPT

Thanks are due to Pearl Forbes and Jan Schofield for information provided to complement the article about the church's ship model.

Tracing the family of the model-maker Captain John McMillan was complicated by the fact that there are three variations of the surname in the official records of the time – McMillan, MacMillan and McMillan.


Although the brass plaque in the case mentions Cordon, which had been the McMillan family home, by the time the model was built he was living with his wife, Mary Ann Mathie, in Craigdhu, along Shore Road towards Clauchlands. The house next door, New Lanark, was owned by Donald McKelvie – then described as 'Baker and Shopkeeper' – who, of course, became world-renowned for breeding famous potato varieties such as Arran Pilot, Victory, Chieftain and, (as we all know) Banner. The property in Cordon continued to be occupied by his spinster sisters – Mary and Elizabeth McMillan.

The house Craigdhu belonged to John McMillan, but it was not until 1921 that he purchased the feu, meaning that he owned the ground instead of renting it, from – (believe it or not) – 'Captain The Most Honourable James Graham, commonly called the Marquess of Graham, C.B, C.V.O, R.N.V.R., and The Most Honourable Mary Louise, Marchioness of Graham, acting under the Trust Settlement of The Most Noble William Alexander Louis Stephen, Duke of Hamilton, Brandon and Chatelherault, K.T., now deceased." James Graham subsequently became 6th Duke of Montrose (1925-54). His wife, Mary Louise Douglas-Hamilton, through whom he acquired the Arran Estate, died as Dowager Duchess in 1957.

The document does not record the exact price paid by Captain McMillan – although it was less than £500 – but the effect was to transfer ownership of the ground, for which he had paid £35 per year in rent, in return for an annual feu duty of £7. Feu duties were eventually abolished by the Scottish Parliament in the year 2000, although the great majority had been redeemed before this date.

John McMillan died in 1931, and when his widow followed in 1943 the house was sold to James and Elizabeth Walker. Presumably they also inherited the ship model, because it was Mrs. Walker who persuaded Rev. Douglas Fulton to accept it as a donation to the church, where its stay was not to be without incident.


At some point, around 1990, a fall of plasterwork from the church roof destroyed the glass display case and caused serious damage to the Falls of Clyde.



The task of repairing it was undertaken by John, the late husband of Pearl Forbes, who was a keen and skilful model-maker, and who managed to return it to its present immaculate condition. A new display case was provided by Dick Haydon, one of the Elders.

As far as the real Falls of Clyde is concerned, the Hawaii Harbour Authority still wishes her to be removed, but the Friends are hopeful that the vessel may yet be returned to her Scottish home. David O'Neill of the Old Gorbals Heritage organization is gathering support and resources, and Alison Thewliss, MP for Glasgow Central, has been reported as offering her backing to the repatriation campaign. We will keep you posted about further developments.
