Dear Friends

Pentecost Sunday is June 4th and we will be celebrating that special day when the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples in such a spectacular demonstration of power. Pentecost brings the Spirit right into our lives in a way never experienced before.

June 4th is also when we share in the Sacrament of Communion. What a day it will be! A double celebration of God's power and presence among us!

Of course, the Spirit has been around long before the first Pentecost - right from the beginning of time and even before that!

"In the beginning, God createdand the Spirit of God was moving over the waters." Genesis 1 v 2

We remember too the Spirit descending like a dove when Jesus rises from the waters of baptism, and a voice comes from heaven saying,


"This is my beloved Son in whom I am well pleased."

Mark 1 v 11

It is the Spirit who drives Jesus into the desert immediately after this awesome moment – 40 days and 40 nights of testing straight after God acknowledges His Son. It doesn't seem fair, does it?! One moment blessed beyond belief and the next isolated and attacked by the Devil. However, Jesus emerges the winner from that harassing time, ready to begin His public ministry. After His baptism, after His times of trial in the wilderness, He is fit for purpose! God sent His Son into the world to show us His infinite love.

Pentecost is Greek for 50 days. There are 50 days after Easter and the disciples seem to have forgotten already this life-changing promise of the Spirit.

Communion is both an individual privilege and a unifying sharing in the crucified, risen Lord who loves us beyond anything we can imagine.

May we all prepare for our Pentecost Communion. We could begin by reading Ephesians 1 verses 13 - 23.

Come to church on June 4th ready to break bread together, ready and expecting God to touch YOUR life, and our life together, through the most amazing gift of His Holy Spirit.


Songs of Praise will take place on Lamlash Green on **Sunday the 9th of July at 3pm**.

GIFT AID - ANOTHER GOOD YEAR!



Having submitted Lamlash Church's Gift Aid claim for the 2016/17 year to HM Revenue & Customs, I am delighted to inform you that a refund of £6083.14 has just been deposited in our church bank account.

The extra income from the Gift Aid envelopes, which have been more obvious and readily available spread around the church, are being used by some of our visitors or non-regular locals who are UK taxpayers. By simply filling in the details on the donation envelope, I am able to claim back the tax at no extra cost to the individual. Donations from Gift Aid envelopes alone totalled £402 in 2016, which is wonderful. HMRC has given us £100.50 on top of that.

Can I urge all members of the congregation to help encourage any visiting friends or relatives, who are taxpayers, to place their offering in a GiftAid envelope and complete their details.

The donation tin at the Church Coffee Mornings has also been very successful with £819.01 being collected between May 2016 – 5/4/17. Under the Small Donation Scheme the taxman has given us an extra 25% on top of that so it's well worth doing and is a valuable extra to the income the coffee morning already generates. **THANK YOU ALL!!!**

Please bear in mind, however, that the 'GASDS' small donation scheme has a ceiling limit of £8000 - and this includes donations received through the offering plate and donation tin in each financial year. As we are close to this limit, can I please encourage as many more people as possible who can make their donation a Gift Aid one to do so.

It just means we are guaranteed more money from HMRC.



May I appeal again to any of our congregation who are paying UK tax through their salary, pension or savings and wish to help their donation go 25% further **at no extra expense to themselves** to please complete a GiftAid form?

Speak to Robert or myself if you have any questions or require assistance, we will gladly help you find any answers you are seeking. You can set up a Standing Order through your bank for regular payments, write a cheque or use a Freewill offering envelope. Some people prefer to give quarterly or even once or twice a year, it is entirely your choice


The committee have already got their notes for next year and suggestions for speakers to "GO IN LOVE" are being formulated into a syllabus.

ORGAN NOTES

HAIL: RAIN: SHINE: HEATWAVE: NORTHERLY DRIFTS

WHY do weather changes affect our Organ?

SURELY it is snugly comfortable <u>inside</u> the church building!

BUT the church is only cosy and snug when the heating is ON!

SO our Organ is at the mercy of the extreme variations of weather for most of its life.

WHY should that matter? Just as humans thrive on moderate temperatures and humidity, so does our Organ!

THE ORGAN MECHANISM is called 'The Action' and is composed of hundreds of wooden parts; it enables the organist to press a key directing wind pressure (supplied by 'the Blower') to selected pipes and causing them to 'speak'.

The pipes you can see outside the big cabinets are metal and they sound the low notes. Inside the cabinets there are also metal pipes but many are made of wood.

Wood remains a very suitable material for these purposes but it does distort when subjected to extremes of temperature putting pipes "out of tune".

SO, electric convector heaters (thermostatically controlled) are fitted in each cabinet. (The piano has one as well and so does the organist- I'm glad to say!) AND a bucket of water is kept in each cabinet to prevent dehydration.

In spite of these precautions, extremes of temperature and humidity do occur so regular servicing is necessary.

WHAT IS A PIPE ORGAN?

A Military Band makes a good comparison. Each has brass and woodwind instruments. The band may have 20 or 30+ instrumentalists all playing one note at a time.

The Organ has one organist playing hundreds of pipes and can play many notes at the same time using hands and feet. It has several keyboards (2 for hands and 1 for feet). Up to 4 manuals are common enabling good use to be made of the many pipes.

TUNING

In a Band each player tunes his/her own instrument before a performance to ensure it is "in tune" with all the other instruments. An Organ is tuned by a specialist and assistant every 6 months - it would be impossible for one person to tune hundreds of pipes without total knowledge of the layout of every pipe and an assistant to hold down the correct note on the keyboard.

A notebook is kept on the consul where any problems can be recorded in order to assist the tuner when he comes.

The TUNER will check all the 'Action' and pipes as routine, paying particular attention to the notebook records.

If tuning was not properly done the Congregation would become increasingly distressed by discords and tuning faults - And we can't have that! - can we?

Our Organ was built in 1934 and is good for another 85 years if well serviced!

A MINISTER'S LOT.....

"It is questionable whether any equally small extent of country in Scotland has had an increase in the number of church buildings comparable to that of Arran. It is out of all due proportion to the size of the population of the island."

These words were written in 1912 by the Rev. J Kennedy Cameron, Minister of the Free Church of Scotland in Brodick (1890-1906), and latterly Professor of Systematic Theology, Free Church College, Edinburgh.

In these more secular days, it is hard for us to appreciate that religious observance had such an overarching influence on the lives of the people of that era that no fewer than twenty-one Ministers – utilizing twenty-one purpose built churches – tended to an Arran flock of around five thousand residents in the years leading up to the First World War. Of course, the reason for the apparently disproportionate church provision in Arran lay in the disputatious nature of ministers and congregations which led to schisms and disruptions.

The first Kilbride minister to suffer as a result of such disputes was John Cunison, who was removed from his post in 1662. King Charles II, after his restoration, had determined that Bishops should be introduced to the Church of Scotland, and Cunison was one minister who rebelled. According to Cameron, he was succeeded by two 'subservient minions of the prelates'.

One of them, Archibald Beith, is, as far as we know, the only Kilbride minister to have been convicted of murder. In 1671, a royal proclamation was issued authorizing the people to prevent the import of meal from Ireland. A boat with such a cargo put into Lamlash, but was detained by the zealous Beith, who, in a sense owed his living to Charles II. When it attempted to escape, Beith and his party pursued in a second boat, and fired on them, killing Allan Gardiner, a merchant of Irvine, and one of his crew. For this he was tried at the High Court in Edinburgh, and sentenced to be hanged at the Cross. He was pardoned by the King, but did not return to Arran, and is last recorded as requesting the Town Council of Rothesay to grant a beggar's licence. He was awarded £20 Scots, but no licence.

John Cunison was restored to his charge in 1690, although what he had been doing for the previous twenty-eight years is not recorded.

The other major issue which concerned the Church of Scotland throughout the 17^{th} and 18^{th} centuries was that of patronage – the right of heritors (landowners) to nominate ministers to vacant parishes.

In his most famous novel — 'Annals of the Parish' - John Galt (1779-1839) describes the reaction of the congregation on the installation of the Rev. Micah Balwhidder as Minister.


"The year 1760 was the occasion of my placing in the parish of Dalmailing. It was a great affair; for I was put in by the patron and the people know nothing whatsoever about me, and their hearts were stirred into strife on the occasion, and they did all within their power to keep me out, insomuch that there was a guard of soldiers to protect the presbytery. The people were really mad and vicious, and flung dirt upon us as we passed, and held out the finger of scorn at me; but I endured it with a resigned spirit. Poor old Mr Kilfuddy of the Braehill got such a clash of glaur on the side of his face that his eye was almost extinguished.

When we got to the church door, it was found to be nailed up, so as by no possibility to be opened. The sergeant of the soldiers wanted to break it in, but I was afraid that the heritors would grudge and complain of the expense of a new door. We were therefore obligated to go in through a window, and the crowd followed us, in a most irreverent manner, making the Lord's house like an inn on a fair day, with their grievous yellyhooing.

During the time of the psalms and the sermon they behaved themselves better, but when the induction came on their clamour was dreadful. Thomas Thorl, the weaver, got up and protested, "Verily, verily, I say unto you, he that entereth not by the door into the sheepfold, but climbeth up some other way, the same is a thief and a robber."

No such event occurred on Arran, but there was a notable protest when the patron – the Duke of Hamilton – appointed the Rev Dugald Crawford to Kilmory parish in 1815. The congregation reacted by deserting the parish church during his six years of tenure, continuing services in the great cave on the shore below Kilpatrick, where dissenting ministers came to administer baptisms and communion. The hapless Crawford drowned when his boat sank during a crossing to Arran in 1821, and the congregation returned to the church, having approved his successor. (to be continued)

The speaker was from Trading Standards Fraud Section

Andy said he did not wish to scare us but I think most were shocked at the level of fraud and how clever the perpetrators were at avoiding prosecution. He stressed that the one person you need protection from is <u>yourself</u>, when you get that feeling of doubt then don't ignore it. If something seems too good to be true, then it is.

When you want a job done check with other people who have had it done and the price. If you have someone on your doorstep offering to do it cheaper – you are very unlikely to get a good and lasting job done. If you think that someone looks a bit shifty, look out for your neighbours and phone the Police. If several calls are taken at the police station, they will check it out. The perpetrators use bogus names, phones and signs on their vans. They look out for vulnerable people where there will be no witnesses.

As to nuisance telephone calls, BT. can supply call blockers. We were shocked to learn that BT. sell on numbers as it is a privately owned business. The same applies to Royal Mail. Someone in Africa or elsewhere can have mail sent onto them using a U.K. post box. If you are told you have won something and have to send money to release it-think! Have I done any competition? If not, then you have not won. There is a web site Action Fraud you can check out but again the perpetrators can pay Google to take their name off. Andy has worked 37 years and is saddened that nothing has changed and that he still cannot prosecute the offenders that he believes are guilty.

He said that at one point police could turn back workmen at the pier but with R.E.T and people's rights, that no longer happens. When asked how action can't be taken, he said that plenty of legislation has been passed but it is not enforced. The only real action is to look after ourselves and neighbours and remember <u>scammers need secrecy</u> to be successful.

IF GOD SHOULD GO ON STRIKE


How good is it that God above has never gone on strike














