

A Word from the Manse

Jesus said to them, "I have been given all authority in heaven and on earth. Go, then to all people everywhere and make them my disciples." Matthew 28 v 18 -19.

#### Dear Friends

These verses from Matthew's Gospel are known as the Great Commission. Jesus sends His disciples out to make more disciples who are to be baptised in the Name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. These new disciples are to obey everything Jesus commanded and He promises to be with them always.

All disciples were to continue to go out and make more disciples and so the church grew in ever-increasing circles all over the world.

We were once new disciples and the challenge of the Great Commission was given to us. Have we done as Jesus commanded us? More importantly, perhaps, have we CONTINUED to do as Jesus commands us?

Somewhere along the line for many congregations the joy of going out and making new disciples disappeared from their church life. They grew comfortable with the pews filled every Sunday. They grew comfortable with church organisations filling the halls to bursting every day of the week. Then we woke up one day and discovered life had changed and people had found a hundred and one things to do on a Sunday rather than come to church. We ran out of leaders for the organisations and generations of people, young and not so young, fell through cracks we allowed to creep in and grow wider and wider until one day we began to realise that, if nothing changes, the church may well disappear through the cracks too.

Over recent years, we have witnessed this up and down the country - in cities, in towns, in villages. The church has shut its doors in many places because members are slow to respond to the changes needed.

All the heartache and disillusionment could have been avoided if God's people had been faithful disciples and not let the Great Commission disappear from our worship and our witness.

We are approaching the seasons of Advent and Christmas. It is a good time to remember not just that Jesus came into the world but WHY He came.



# 'God loved the world so much, He gave His only Son, that everyone who believes in Him, may not die but have eternal life!' John 3 v 16.

How did we get it so wrong? When did we stop going out in the power of God's love and making new disciples? The answers to these questions are irrelevant!

#### Our focus is on 'What do we do now?'

Well, the Church of Scotland has taken the initiative and embarked on a movement called The Path of Renewal which has been running for 18 months with 40 congregations involved. We applied to be part of the next 40 congregations and we have been attending conferences and meetings to learn more.

By the time you read this we will have been told that we are indeed on the Path of Renewal. It is an exciting time for Lamlash Church as we try to examine how God may lead us on together to go out in His Name and build new relationships, build new community, make new disciples.

The going out will involve all sorts of things and all sorts of people.

It is less about thinking outside the box and more about throwing the box away and starting over - starting by renewing our own hearts and minds.

Years of sitting in church waiting, hoping, praying more people will come in, on the whole, have proved fruitless.

It is time to go out and learn to be church where the people are. Where are the families, the young people, the isolated, the working folk, the busy men, women and children who have no time for God in their lives?

Our going out may take many forms. Be ready! Be supportive! Be surprised by the joy of reaching out, by being church in our community! Be aware that we are not talking about 'churchy' things as we know them! Be praying!

Love came down at Christmas. Love still walks our streets and shores. Love is looking for His people to join Him out there.

Being accepted to be part of the Path of Renewal is just the beginning of the adventure of the rest of our lives - lives for whom Jesus came into the world, lived and died and lives again. We have so much love to share!

May this Christmas be a time of blessing for you all.

May 2018 find us excited by new adventures in the love of our Saviour and Lord.


Suddenly a great company of the heavenly host appeared with the angel, praising God and saying,

Lord as we worship here in the village named after saintly Molashe<sup>1</sup> of old, we acknowledge other darker things that this place speaks of from past times. Nordic runes cut deep



As we profess Jesus as Lord in the old parish church of Kilbride not 100 metres from here stands the Clearances Memorial. It reminds us that once a hungry and dispossessed generation were forced into exile on this very shore, leaving nothing behind but longings for home and a cairn of stones on Lamlash Green from whence their faithful minister preached a farewell sermon of encouragement to help face a hard life in an alien land, a land full of danger and challenges, and yet a land which also held out the promise of freedom and betterment.

And so we remember those today who face economic hardship still, the daily grind of survival and subsistence existence and those who are forced to seek a new life in a foreign place, the refugee and economic migrant, as well as those who seek asylum from the war zones and killing fields of terror. May they too know the promise and hope of a better life, the kind of life we enjoy and must never take for granted. Help us to continue to strive for peace and to build a world where all can live in security and freedom from persecution.




## **The Singing Group**

forward to the last Thursday in the month. Recently, Arco entertained us and our percussion playing has added a new and super fun aspect with everyone joining in the Latin rhythms.


We have been trying to start a second date each month but we really have to wait until staff pressures at Coorie Doon and Montrose House have been resolved.

Anne Mitchell wrote to Mary 1/11/17 advising "the total received from all the churches taking part on Arran was 181 shoe boxes and £653 in donations. These were sent off the island yesterday

via Arran Haulage and should be on the pallets ready for transporting."

The shoe boxes will now be well on the way to the country they are destined for.

Over the years, and through Sunday School World Vision and TearFund, from 1989 to 2003, and through Cool Club and World Vision from 2003

onwards we have sponsored a number of children in India and other South-East Asian countries.

Our present sponsored child is Bakul Peter, who lives with his family in the Ghoraghat region of Bangladesh.

Bakul Peter is 12, and he and his family and village benefit from our sponsorship, which currently stands at £26 per month. We are very grateful to those who help to carry forwards this Christian work.

World Vision only becomes involved in projects, such as providing wells for clean water or teaching more efficient farming methods, after consultation with local village or district elders. In this way, every child is seen as equal.

### Women in Black, Arran

At the invitation of the Editor, Elsa Rodeck writes

On the last Saturday of each month a group of women come together in Brodick to stand for peace. We do this as part of a broader movement around the world called Women in Black. Women in Black started in 1988 in Jerusalem by a group of Israeli women who wanted to show their opposition to the Israeli occupation of Palestinian territories. They stood in silence, wearing black, and holding placards, and thereafter came each week at the same hour and to the same location. This simple protest, that could be done anywhere, with their children beside them, soon spread to other parts of Israel. The idea then moved further afield with solidarity vigils springing up in Europe, the US and Canada, India and Australia. Today the reasons for meeting have broadened beyond the Israel-Palestine conflict, and women across the world hold vigils for a variety of causes. But for all, women come to bear witness and express their commitment to and hope for peace in the world, and against all war. With this intention, we started a vigil in Arran at the end of 2015. From a small two women effort, some months the group grows to a considerable size of 12!

I spoke to several of the group about why they come to Women in Black, and about what it means to them. The women in Arran who join the vigil come from a wide variety of ages, faiths and backgrounds. These influence the reasons why they come to Women in Black but as one woman put it, "We may all have various ways of looking at the world but we have the same hope - to work for peace, not war". Another woman had heard about Women in Black some years ago, through a Quaker friend who had spent time in Israel and Palestine as an Ecumenical Accompanier, and told of her experience of Women in Black in that region. She says, "So when I heard a Women in Black was starting here, I was thrilled to be able to be part of it," and "have the opportunity at this age to join a movement. Sitting holding a placard is about what I want to do. I can be a witness to a need for conflict resolution and peace because it's the biggest need there is, and I hope it makes people think a bit". Some women have campaigned for peace, and with CND particularly, for many years. One woman said, "I've always wanted to work against wars and violence. Having lived a long time, if I can help a little by showing I'm against wars; and really it's violence of all kinds I hate. My husband and I were in CND for a long time. We used to have a caravan and we'd take it down to Brodick, and different areas, and put up anti-nuclear signs, and people wanted to talk about it."

Bringing awareness to other people about peace is an aim that many of the women have for Women in Black; as is the idea that our vigil is itself peaceful. Women in Black is not about chanting, shouting, or angry demonstrations. One woman says she likes it because, "There's no violence, no shouting, or anger. We're sitting peacefully, not throwing rocks etc..." While another says, "I go to Women in Black because I think a peaceful demonstration makes a clear point. There is so much noise and anger that when you stop and stand to make a point it's deeper, more poignant. It's important to do it, because everyone is shouting about war and arguing with each other, that it's good to be quiet".

In Arran, and Scotland, and the West more generally, we are fortunate enough not to live our lives in the midst of a devastating conflict. However with Trident submarines on our doorstep, and the threat of global war perhaps never far away, we stand at our monthly vigils to highlight the constant need for working against these situations and the suffering that goes on. People may have a feeling that there is nothing that ordinary citizens can do. Politicians make decisions for us about global security and fund weapons systems which many of us would never support. But by joining Women in Black we bring the belief that, as one of our group said, "The more people who are aware the better, we do have the power to change. Even in the mind, the more people who think positively and wish for peace, it will have an impact".

Women in Black in Arran are always keen to welcome new and interested people. And despite the 'Women' in the title, sympathetic men are also welcome in Arran! Any readers who wish to come, meet at the Coastal Way start in Brodick at 1pm on the last Saturday of each month, and in all weathers!!

At a time when we are thinking of peace on earth and goodwill to all men, please remember the church voices support for a ban on nuclear weapons. For those without access to the internet, here is a direct lift from the Church of Scotland website.



"Since 1983 the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland has held the position that nuclear arms are by nature morally and theologically wrong. In 2015 the General Assembly reaffirmed the Church's position that the ownership of, use of and threat to use nuclear weapons are inherently evil and stated its support for an international Nuclear Ban Treaty."

Speaking last year, the Very Rev Dr Russell Barr, then Moderator of the General Assembly said:

"Attempts to sustain peace through the threat of indiscriminate mass destruction could not be further from the peace to which Christ calls us. It is vital that the UK demonstrates the sort of change it wants to see in the world; building peace through strong and courageous leadership and not by commissioning more nuclear weapons."

On Friday 7 July over 120 states voted to adopt a treaty prohibiting Nuclear Weapons. Speaking after the decision Rev Dr. Richard Frazer, convener of the Church of Scotland's Church and Society Council said:

In 1972 the world banned biological weapons; we have subsequently banned chemical weapons, anti-personnel landmines and cluster munitions. Today the UN has agreed the Nuclear Ban Treaty.

"While there is much more that needs to be done before we can rid the world of nuclear weapons, this represents a significant step forward and will make the possession of these weapons morally and practically more difficult.

"Nuclear weapons are indiscriminate in their impact and the disproportionate scale of suffering that they are capable of unleashing makes them unjustifiable. Steps now need to be taken to urge our own government to take further their own commitments to nuclear disarmament, particularly in light of last year's disappointing decision to renew Trident."

#### The Beveridge Report – 75 years on

We take it for granted that all children will receive secondary education, people who are ill will be treated under a national health service and we will all be paid a State pension when we retire. Indeed, we regard these benefits as routine, perhaps not realising this has not always been the case.

Turn the clock back to World War 2. The British people accepted their wartime deprivation with a strong sense of unity and purpose in the face of a common enemy. At the same time, it was recognised that long-standing inequalities should be rectified when times improved. The British Government, which was then a coalition of political parties, commissioned Sir William Beveridge to investigate the best way of helping people on low incomes.

The resultant Beveridge Report identified five 'Giant Evils' of Want, Disease, Ignorance, Squalor and Idleness. It proposed that in return for all people of working age paying a weekly contribution, benefits should be available to those who were sick, unemployed, retired or widowed.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, William Temple, said "this is the first time anybody has set out to embody the whole spirit of the Christian ethic in an Act of Parliament", for at the war's end the Beveridge Report began to be implemented. The 1944 Education Act was followed in 1948 by the founding of the NHS. Social security benefits meant people in need could be cared for from the cradle to the grave. Temple had himself published a vision for post-war Britain, called "Christianity and the Social Order". Temple, Beveridge and the economic historian R H Tawney had been at university together and shared both Christian idealism and the urge to make it work.

This month is the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Beveridge's Report. The Welfare State is now woven into the fabric of British Society. Like all reforms, it needs regular attention to ensure the original vision hasn't been obscured over time. Today's Universal Credit is a step in the right direction, though its clumsy roll-out needs rapid modification if the intended recipients are to be paid on time.

Christians may want to reflect on the Welfare State. Is it a right or a privilege to be beneficiaries? Do we take it for granted as our due, or are we grateful for what we receive?



#### LET THERE BE LIGHT

#### Genesis 1:3

The recent furore about fracking serves to remind us of Scotland's long history of involvement in the oil industry. Most people would be surprised to know that

the world's first commercial oil-works were established here in 1851, eight years before the first oil well was drilled in Pennsylvania. The location was West Lothian, and the pioneer was a Glasgow man called James Young – who may or may not have rejoiced in his nickname of 'Paraffin' Young.

Anyone travelling in the Bathgate area can hardly fail to notice the enormous heaps of reddish waste left over after the manufacturing process had removed lubricating oil, naphtha (kerosene), and paraffin from the soft shale deposits mined in the district. And it was the paraffin lamp which was to revolutionise domestic, educational and business life, especially in rural Scotland.

It is hard for us to imagine life without artificial illumination. In his great work 'Social Life in Scotland in the 18<sup>th</sup> Century', Henry Grey Graham gives us a flavour of what it was like for most people who could not afford the luxury of candles.

"In bygone times, folk were obliged to take as much work out of the day as possible, for there was little to be done when darkness set in except to go to bed. In the homes of the poor there was no light except from the fitful gleams of the peat fire, as the only means of illuminating the dingy hole was the smoky glimmer of the "ruffy" – a wick stuck in the cleft of a fir stick, or a stalk of hemp, and lit for such occasions as family worship."

But now a portable and affordable source of light opened up all sorts of possibilities – evening classes in the newly formed Mechanics Institutes, hobbies and reading at home, and public libraries open in the evenings to cater for working people.

Lamlash, of course, already had its own subscription library, as reported by Rev. Allan McNaughton, Minister of Kilbride Parish (1826-1844).

"In the year 1824, a few public-spirited individuals established a small library in the parish; and to make it easily accessible to all, the amount of the subscription was fixed at 1/- per annum. There are at present about 80 members, and the subscriptions are collected once a year at a general meeting at which books to be added to the collection are proposed and voted for.

The collection consists of about 300 volumes, including excellent works in history, biography, popular science, geography and practical divinity. Most of the religious books, either originally composed in Gaelic, or translated into Gaelic from the English language, have always a great circulation among the more aged of the subscribers."

None of the early records appear to have survived, however - thanks to the salvage efforts of Vic Shaw - Cash Book No.2 of the Kilbride Library, which runs from 1864 to 1880 provides some information. Membership continued to hover around the 80 mark, and first on the list in January 1864 was 'Mr Paterson, Whitehouse'. He, of course, was James Paterson, Factor to the Duke of Hamilton, and his position on the list suggests that since Lamlash did not have a public hall or library building, he provided the storage facilities in the Whitehouse.

Other subscribers included the Rev. Colin Campbell (Kilbride Minister 1844-1883), John McBride (farmer, Holy Isle), James Tod (farmer, Burican), and Richard Jones (blacksmith, living in a house on the site of what was later to become Hamilton Terrace). Mr Jones also has the doubtful privilege of being the current author's great-great-grandfather. The 1864 membership included "Mrs Captain McKellar" (Blairbeg), who was obviously proud of the status of captain's wife. The curious thing about this situation was that Mary McKellar was already a widow, her husband Alexander having expired (from 'overstimulation by alcohol') aboard his vessel in Glasgow Harbour in April 1863. She subsequently returned to Glasgow.


The accommodation situation was eased in the late 1870s, when the Parish Hall – now the Church Hall - was built by public subscription and a grant from the Baird Trust of Glasgow. It contained a library and reading room, and it is likely that the subscription library was absorbed into the new facility. One of the later members was Mrs Mary Jamieson – already familiar to us in her previous life as proprietor of the Corrie Hotel & Ballroom. She had retired to Lamlash, and comes to our notice yet again at the official opening of Kilbride Parish Church in June 1886.

According to the report in the Campbeltown Courier –

"The new church was opened by the Rev. Norman McLeod, of St Stephen's Edinburgh. Mrs Jamieson, Altachorvie, a lady of 95 years, was present, and it was thought peculiarly appropriate that she should be the first worshipper to enter the new church. About a thousand people were present."




Do you know why there are so many robins on Christmas cards? The first postmen in Victorian times wore red and were called robins, so robins were shown as delivering cards.

#### **CARD or DECORATION**

Here is a simple 3-D Christmas tree that you can use as a decoration or a card. You will need green card, crayons, glitter or paint, scissors and sticky tape.



Fold a piece of card in half, then cut it in half. Put the two pieces a together and fold them in half again.

Draw half a Christmas tree opposite the fold. Cut along the line and you will have 2 identical trees. Fold the trees in half, very lightly, hardly creasing the centre line to mark the centre of the tree. Cut a slit along the bottom half of the centre of one tree and along the top half of the centre of the other tree. Slip the two trees together along the slits. To help the tree to stand firmly, use sticky tape to fasten the parts together where they meet.



Decorate the tree. If you are using it as a card then leave an area free of decorations so that you can write on it.
